

Administrative Procedure 216 - Off Campus Education

Background

The Division supports the provision of off campus education to provide opportunities for junior and senior high school students to:

- explore and expand their career interests, skills and knowledge related to work and other life roles;
- assist them in making wise decisions regarding their future education, training and employment;
- allow them to transition from school to work and/or post-secondary institutions.

Off-campus education is an experiential method of learning that

- reinforces, extends and motivates student learning;
- integrates a student's classroom studies with recognized on-the-job work experiences;
- uses a set of planned educational experiences related to work and other life roles through their participation in out-of-class study, observation and/or performance in community-based work sites and/or work stations;
- involves volunteer activities and/or paid employment.

Procedures

- 1. Off-campus education requires a partnership involving the school, parent, student and employing organization (i.e., business, industry, government or not-for-profit agency) with each of the partners sharing the responsibility for student growth and learning.
- 2. Follow all procedures outline in the *Alberta Education Off-campus Education Handbook* (Mandatory as of September 1, 2019)
