Strategic Planning and Budget Development for 2025-26

Policy, Infrastructure, and Community Relations:

Policy Refinement:


- Policy 21 Clearview Awards: Updated to streamline the nomination process and clarify categories such as the Community Excellence Award, Partner in Educational Excellence Award, and Student Excellence Award. The Award of Merit's eligibility requirements were also revised to ensure clarity and inclusivity in recognitions. Nominations have opened, and forms are available on the division's website.
- Policy 25 Financial Allocation: This policy was revised to optimize financial resource distribution across educational and operational needs, ensuring fiscal responsibility and strategic fund utilization.

Infrastructure Development:

• Discussions focused on critical capital projects necessary for the enhancement of educational facilities. This includes planning for new construction and upgrades to existing structures to accommodate evolving educational demands and enhance learning environments.

Community and External Relations:

• The board emphasized the importance of robust partnerships, highlighting proactive efforts to engage with community partners and stakeholders. These collaborations aim to strengthen community bonds and enrich the educational experiences provided by Clearview, demonstrating the division's commitment to inclusivity and active community participation.



Presentation Highlights: Rupertsland Institute Métis Centre of Excellence

The presentation made to the Clearview Board of Trustees showcased the vital contributions of the Rupertsland Institute. This institute focuses on enhancing Métis education through tailored resources, professional development, and community-based learning opportunities. Here are the key points covered:

1. Education Resources and Initiatives:

 The presentation highlighted various resources available through the Centre, including online courses and classroom materials that reflect and celebrate Métis culture and history. These resources are designed to support educators in providing a comprehensive and inclusive curriculum.

2. Professional Development:

 A strong emphasis was placed on professional development opportunities tailored for educators. These include workshops and courses aimed at building foundational knowledge about the Métis, such as the Métis Foundational Knowledge Themes Online Course. This training helps educators integrate Métis perspectives into their teaching practices effectively.

3. Community Engagement and Learning:

 The Centre's approach includes significant community involvement, with programs that invite educators and students to engage with Métis culture directly. Examples include virtual field trips and interactions with Métis artists and knowledge holders, which enrich the educational experience and foster a deeper understanding of Métis identity and heritage.

4. Support for Métis Visibility and Representation:

 Efforts to ensure Métis visibility in education were discussed, highlighting the importance of authentic Métis representation in educational materials. This includes the use of Métisauthored resources and imagery that accurately portrays the historical and contemporary lives of Métis people.

This presentation to the board underlined the crucial role of the <u>Rupertsland Institute</u> in promoting and facilitating a richer, more inclusive educational landscape within Clearview Public Schools.
